Background of the workshop

- Results-based approaches to aid high on the (donor) agenda
- Concepts are under discussion & pilots are under preparation
- Some ongoing discussions / fora dealing with the result agenda (EU network, Practitioners group, Building Bloc, CGD/DIE workshop...)



- Several questions:
 - Definitions and criteria \rightarrow Broad or narrow approach?
 - Underlying assumptions: Results approaches provide advantages and overbalance disadvantages, closing the attribution gap → Incentive for donors to relabel aid interventions?
 - Results focus in different settings and on different levels → Macro and / or micro incentive interventions?
 - Consequences of the results agenda on aid effectiveness (alignment, harmonization, pool arrangements ...) → Need to revise aid effectiveness agenda? How to deal with trade offs?
 - Clear demand of developing countries \rightarrow A donor driven agenda?
 - What kind of evidence & empirical data do we need (beyond intervention related information)?



≻ Need …

- ... for aid agencies to get and better understanding on concepts and approaches
- ... for think tanks and academia to reflect on appropriate strategies
- ...to interact between practitioners and research
