## WELCOME

Dear participant,

The German Development Institute / Deutsches Institut für Entwicklungspolitik (DIE), The Energy and Resources Institute (TERI), and Galvanizing the Groundswell of Climate Actions (GGCA) warmly welcome all participants to the 'Bonn Groundswell Workshop - Catalyzing climate action for resilient development'.

### BACKGROUND

Climate actions by cities, companies, civil society groups, and other actors, individually and in cooperation with each other and with nation states, have great potential to contribute to a low-carbon and climate resilient future. This potential has been increasingly recognized within the UNFCCC process, where non-state actions are showcased in technical examinations and reports, to inspire greater ambition among national governments. However, the "groundswell" of non-state and subnational climate actions is sometimes also seen as a phenomenon driven by the global North. While research shows that Northern actors tend to initiate more "bottom up" actions than Southern actors, it also shows that many cities, companies, national governments, and other actors in the South are taking advantage of these strategies to build low carbon, climate-resilient development. These pioneers demonstrate the extraordinary potential of these kinds of actions to meet immediate development needs ranging from economic inclusion, to health, to agriculture, to energy access.

### FORMAT AND AIMS OF THIS WORKSHOP

As organizers of this workshop, we endeavour to broaden up an ongoing discussion on climate actions, by addressing their full scope of benefits in both developed and developing countries, and by seeking to expand the scale and ambition of the groundswell of climate actions in the global South. We have engaged a very wide range of experts from science, policy, business and civil society, from the global North and the South, to ensure interaction and joint-up thinking about climate actions for resilient development in developing countries.

Ultimately, we seek to realize the full potential of climate actions to address the needs and priorities of developing countries. We have two main objectives. First, we aim to gain insight into **how non-state (and sub-national) climate actions could be strengthened**, for instance by integrating climate and sustainability benefits, by improved capacities to mobilize and to implement climate actions, and by better access to resources. Second, we aim to explore **how governments, UNFCCC secretariat, and other organizations could ensure more effective non-state action in developing countries**, for instance through the 'Paris Lima Action Agenda' (LPAA)<sup>1</sup>, or through initiatives such as the Non-state Actor Zone for Climate Actions ([NAZCA](#)), a platform that showcases commitments to action by companies, cities, subnational regions, and investors to address climate change.

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<sup>1</sup> A joint initiative by the Peruvian Government (the COP20/CMP10 presidency), the French Presidency of COP21/CMP11, the Office of the Secretary-General of the United Nations, and the UNFCCC secretariat, to catalyze and scale up climate action on the ground in order to advance sustainable development that will reduce poverty, promote economic prosperity and greater social well-being.

<b>Kartika Anggraeni</b>	Kartika Anggraeni works as the project coordinator of the SWITCH-Asia Network Facility (NF). Prior to her joining the NF in 2012 and finishing her study in Germany, she once worked as journalist and editor for an Indonesian media company, the Kompas Gramedia. She has a background in environmental science and sustainable management.
<b>Steffen Bauer</b>	Dr. Steffen Bauer is a political scientist at the Department of Environmental Policy and Natural Resources Management at German Development Institute / Deutsches Institut für Entwicklungspolitik (DIE), where he is co-leading the project "Klimalog: Research and Dialogue for a Climate-smart and Just Transformation". Steffen received his PhD from Freie Universität Berlin (FFU). His main research interests are global governance, global environmental politics, the UN and international climate politics.
<b>Felipe Bittencourt</b>	Felipe Bittencourt works at WayCarbon Brazil and has a PhD in climate change. He has 10 years experience in mitigation/adaptation and low carbon economy strategies for the public and private sectors. He is also a World Bank consultant in the field of Energy Efficiency for Cities.

She leads the Blueprint 2015 project, which aims to incrementally build an enabling environment that can secure, by 2015, the level of action by countries required to meet the 1.5 or 2 degree goal and achieve a sustainable low-carbon economy. This action would be captured in an equitable binding agreement in 2015 holding parties accountable for their actions through a robust MRV regime.



<b>Todd Edwards</b>	Todd Edwards is the program officer for climate change at the Stanley Foundation. He has nearly a decade of experience in energy, sustainability, and strategy consulting. Todd is a Ph.D. candidate in political sciences at Vrije Universiteit Brussel, where he focuses on the intersection of state actors and civil society in post-Kyoto negotiations as well as forums for multi-stakeholder cooperation on climate-change policies and initiatives. 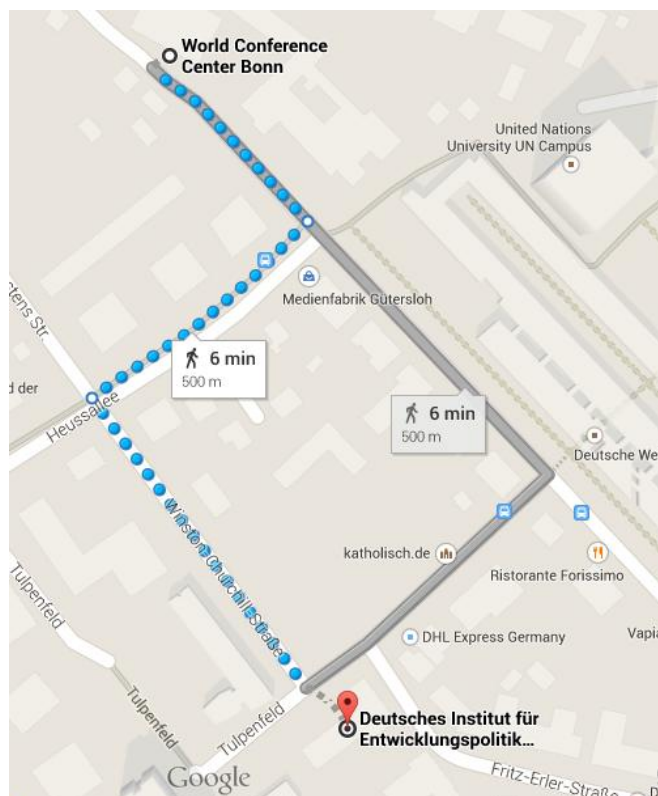

### From DIE to WCCB





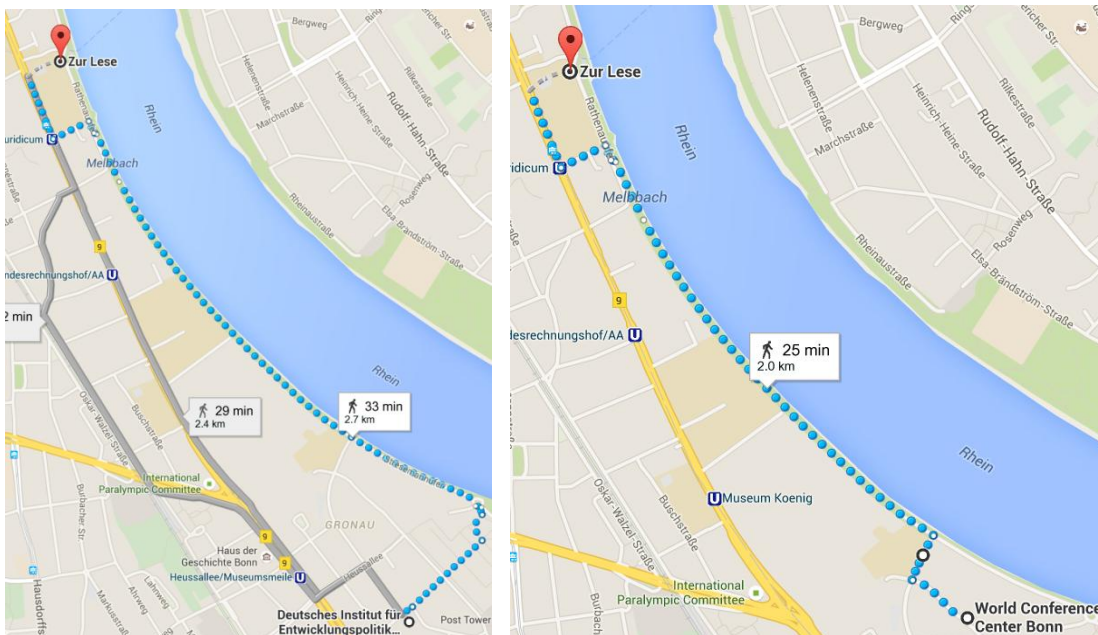
